What is American Sign Language?

American Sign Language (ASL) is a complete, complex language that employs signs made with the hands and other movements, including facial expressions and postures of the body. It is the first language of many Deaf North Americans, and one of several communication options available to Deaf people. ASL is said to be the fourth most commonly used language in the United States.

Where are some American Sign Language Classes in New Mexico?

If you would like to learn in a classroom environment there are a few options. Keep in mind there are differences in cost and whether the student wants to learn conversational ASL or go further and study to be an interpreter. The New Mexico Commission for Deaf and Hard of Hearing (NMCDHH) also maintains a library with ASL books, dictionaries, and videos.
